Brief Annual Report to the Community

Beyond the recession and economic crises we have managed to serve 812 African refugees and immigrants by the generosity of the Lutheran Foundation, International Institute and Daughters of Charity starting from July 1, 2010 ending in June 30, 2011.

We are extremely touched by the moral support and the little financial help from our clients and people even who are laid off themselves. We have achieved a fit of a mountain by volunteers and partial volunteer staff who are dedicated in the principle of a "GIVING TREE". Yes, it is a fit of a mountain to solve the problem of so many with limited financial ability. We have achieved success in assisting 12 clients with their naturalization.

Our weakness had been the understanding of twitter and face book and associated gadgets because of the fear of compromising confidentiality of our clients. If many people are using them in America, such communications must be good. We will explore ways how to fit this modern and largely "millennial" communication to our specific organizational need. We continue to advocate for addressing funding disparities of compassion capital whether administered by Government entities or large foundations. This is an issue the whole nation must reflect on. It is sinful and unpatriotic to use a generous nation for enrichment. When this happens compassion itself loses conscience. Non-profits and foundations must generate good number of fund comparable jobs to make our nation better.

We are thankful for the support of the general African community, for their encouragement and volunteer work. The Executive Director would like to thank Kadar Hussein and Tsehay Mengiste for their evening transportation and interpretation of clients who have health issues. We are indebted to our matured Board whose some members have carried us through the storm for 28 years! We get strength from our American people who have survived so many disasters by their patience, hope, prayers and by being their brothers' and sisters' keepers during this period. As an exceptional country of immigrants America can surmount its temporary economic problems by the power of its democracy and inventiveness.
